# Report of the President and Chief Executive Officer

We are pleased to present this year's annual report for THRIVE. We have so much to celebrate, as we are so proud of the many successes you will see throughout the report. These successes are the result of the hard work of our team, and also from our positive interactions and relationships built with our children, families and community partners.

Our commitment to the vision, mission and values of the agency continues to be the foundation for everything we do. Our dedication to family-centered care, strength-based services, and service excellence is at the centre of all we do and allows us to provide quality and trustworthy services to our children and families.

THRIVE Child Development Centre has a highly engaged, progressive and dedicated Board committed to providing excellent governance and support. THRIVE's staff, Board of Directors and THRIVE Foundation are committed to providing services that will meet the individual needs of children with diverse abilities, in supporting them in achieving their own personal "extraordinary".

Our Strategic Plan, developed in 2022, has guided our work and will continue to do so over this next fiscal year. # **Programs and Services Highlights**

# Community Based/School Based Rehabilitation Services

## Occupational Therapy Services (OT)

There have been many exciting things occurring in the Occupational Therapy Department.

In July 2023, the OT team completed a full service review which resulted in the following decisions/changes:

#### School Based Rehabilitation Services (SBRS)

Service guidelines were developed and implemented that outlined:

- what will be offered to address fine motor concerns which impact students' abilities to meet written expectations
- types of support provided, and for how long, based on age.

THRIVE continued to be a part of CanChild/McMaster Research study on the impact of modifying how Partnering for Change (P4C) is implemented. THRIVE partnered with Huron Superior Catholic District School Board and the Algoma District School Board to implement P4C in 5 schools. The feedback from all the schools, including the Research school, has been positive, and all schools have requested P4C continue during the 2024/25 school year. Education videos and supports have been developed to help Educators understand how sensory-processing can impact self-regulation.

#### Community Based Rehabilitation Services (CBRS)

We identified changes to our service model in OT Community Based services. Children up to the age of 6 will continue to receive services, with some exceptions beyond 6 to ensure supports are in place. The Family Advisory Committee was engaged to figure out how to best roll out this change. The change in the age mandate for CBRS will be rolled out over the 2024/25 fiscal year and will reduce wait times to allow for early intervention.

THRIVE has developed practice guidelines for commonly referred issues that often cannot be resolved by OT alone. Guidelines that have been developed and implemented include: PICA, Toileting, Bus Restraints, and Student Accommodations.

#### Clinics

The Sensory Clinic has updated all the parent education (in-person and virtual). Families are provided with links to education upon referral, to assist with immediate skill building and understanding of their child's sensory strengths and challenges.

## Implementing PPL positions

The leadership structure now includes two Professional Practice Leads - OT to assist in managing clinical operations.

#### Speech and Language Services (SLP)

In January 2024, the SLP department met to review Preschool Speech and Language and Children's Rehabilitation Guidelines issued by the Ministry in the fall of 2023. Discussions and brainstorming around Ministry recommendations took place from January to March 2024 surrounding issues such as waitlist times, age mandates and Tier 1 Intervention services. Ongoing work to implement these auidelines continues. The Speech and Language Department trialed a new leadership structure in January 2023 which consists of 4 Professional Practice Leads (PPL) covering various duties and responsibilities supported by the Professional Services Manager. This model worked very well and final evaluation determined this model would be adopted for this department moving forward.

### Physiotherapy Services (PT)



Over the past year, the Physiotherapy team has worked hard at defining our service priorities and mapping out our pathways for the various program and service areas. This work will prove valuable in allowing timely and equitable services across all of our service areas. There were vacancies over the previous year and THRIVE developed some great partnerships with Radiance Physiotherapy and SHINE Pediatric Physiotherapy to

support in the delivery of services in our Plagiocephaly/ Torticollis pathway. In January 2024, these services were brought back in-house. The team continues to work at streamlining the pathway so that clients receive timely and equitable services.

# **Family Support Services**

Family Support Services had another exciting year that was filled with growth and change. The Infant and Child Development (ICDP) team became complete in early 2024, with the addition of a position based out of the North (Wawa) location, allowing families in the North to have direct and consistent service in their communities. This position became possible because of the hard work and dedication from the Sault based staff that serviced the North in 2022-2023.

The ICDP team also worked extremely hard to develop and implement a strategy to address the waitlist. Clinic days were implemented for the Sault Ste. Marie location, and every Wednesday, families from the waitlist were invited to come in for an initial screen and consultation. At that appointment, families were provided with information about their child's development, and offered education, resources, and strategies to promote development or address priority concerns. Referrals to other THRIVE services or outside community services were also facilitated. This model helped the program meet and achieve program and Ministry standards as children are being seen within 90 days of the initial referral date to THRIVE. The model has also allowed for higher-risk children requiring immediate service to be identified and brought on to caseload in a timely manner.

One other highlight to note with ICDP is the partnership with the Huron Superior Catholic District School Board (HSCDSB). THRIVE now has a half-time ICDP position dedicated to providing services to children identified by the HSCDSB schools, through a specific pathway, to support their transition into their first year of school, (JK or SK). The program is intended to provide services to children who are demonstrating developmental delays and may not have had access or been identified as benefiting from community services prior to their start in JK or SK. Through this pathway, the ICDP consultant provides the service to children and their families, while liaising with the school to ensure positive flows of communication, and to ensure that the necessary planning and support is implemented for the child at the school and home environments.

Finally, the Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder program (FASD) has taken off to new heights! Community and family engagement is consistently growing and the program's presence in the schools has never been better.

# Early Learning Resourcing and H.S. McLellan Preschool

#### H.S. McLellan Preschool

H.S. McLellan Preschool was very excited to invite families into our program over the last year. During the pandemic, we missed the many opportunities to connect with families in person and families missed spending time engaging in activities with their children and educators. Our family events this year included a winter celebration, a fire truck experience, a family planting event, and a year-end celebration. Families were also consulted when planning for summer experiences like mud day, beach day, camp day, and summer Olympics; all days that built upon the interests of children in our program. It has been such an incredible experience to connect once again. A focus of H.S. McLellan Preschool has been to include children, parents, and visiting professionals in the many ways that the children have been involved in exploration, creativity and learning. The educators have used electronic applications, classroom walls and hallways, monitors and white boards to showcase the learning in meaningful ways. A fond memory for the preschool this year, was a strengthened connection with one of our community partners. CiNTAS visits H.S. McLellan Preschool to switch out the wet and dirty mats for new clean ones during the late fall and winter months. The children always cheer for the "Mat Man" when he arrives to change the mats. He made a surprise visit in July this year, bringing with him a special mat that was custom-made for the Preschool. It displays the name "Mat Man" with a cartoon drawing of a superhero with a cape and CiNTAS clip. Both the children and educators were touched by the kindness and relationships built with CiNTAS.









Our educators continue to create soothing environments that foster a sense of calm and engagement. With many professionals, students and families visiting our preschool, we would like all to arrive feeling welcome with a sense of peace.

#### **Early Learning Resources**

Early Learning Resources has been working to support as many children and licensed childcare programs in the district of Algoma as possible. We have a current team of 5 ELR consultants. We have worked to capture all the amazing work being completed by our Early Learning Resource Consultants through an increased gathering of monthly data. Our Early Learning Resources team has been focused on building the capacity of Early Childhood Educators in Algoma. They have been working in partnership with the District of Sault Ste. Marie Social Services Administration Board and the Algoma District Social Services Administration Board. The Consultants have been providing a rotation of scheduled training options throughout SSM and district, including Hanen Teacher Talk, supporting educators to learn to identify children's conversational styles and the role they play in interactions, and Understanding Inclusion through the Foundations of Learning, a look at belonging, well-being, engagement and expression through an inclusive lens. The response to these trainings has been very positive. Early Learning Resources is continuing to explore ways to support programs and children in meaningful ways. A recent endeavor has been a lending materials option in Sault Ste. Marie. Early Learning Resource Consultants provide options to lend materials that support both individual and program needs. The Consultants also provide additional modelling and training on the use of the materials. Following the lending period, programs decide if they would like to purchase similar items. In the district of Algoma, Consultants have been working to support licensed childcare programs with meaningful inclusive language on their walls and in their classrooms. We look forward to a continued partnership with the Algoma District Social Services Administration Board.

# Ontario Autism Program (OAP)

THRIVE's OAP Program provides supports in Behavioural Therapy services. We have been successful in our Fee for Service model, where we offer and provide Applied Behaviour Analysis Services to children and families receiving funding through the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services; THRIVE continues to develop services for children, youth, and families for the new needs-based Ontario Autism Program. We worked diligently with families, along with our OAP Support Coordinator, to gain valuable feedback regarding the needs of our community in terms of service delivery for our OAP clients and families. We have introduced more social skills and group-based programming, as well as flexibility in service locations; now offering OAP services across all of our Thrive locations.

THRIVE has played an active role in the delivery of Foundational Family Services through the Northern Collaborative. Foundational Family Services aim to build a family's capacity to support their child's learning and development. We are in our third year of the OAP Entry to School Program, and this year we added a second location in the Elliot Lake community. The Entry to School Program helps children develop school-readiness skills and provides transition supports as they enter kindergarten or Grade 1 for the first time.

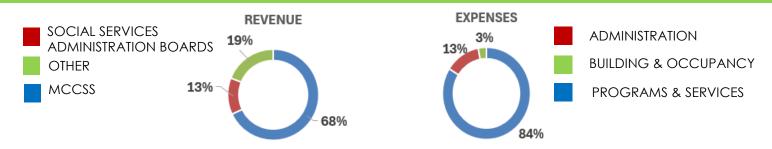

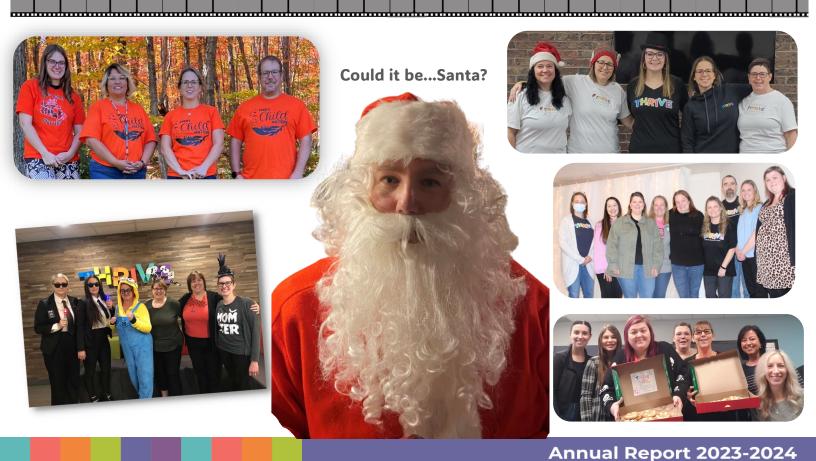


# 25 Years of Service
